

Our Annual General Meeting

was held in September and the new Governing Committee was elected. Members travelled from all over the Barkly Region for the meeting and Thanks to Penny Phillips and Frances Mayers for conducting meetings in most communities prior to the AGM.

The media crew have been busy filming local events, such as the Rodeo and the BAFL Grand Final. A film trip to Elliott by the men, to film Mr. John Devlin making traditional Wood carvings, also took place. The women and Peter also went bush with the CDEP Ladies to film and document any bush tucker around at present.

We had a visit this month from the representatives of the Waanyi people and plans are now under way to record the speakers of this endangered language within the next few months. We also discussed how we can aid in resourcing their schools and library with literature that can help increase the usage of the Waanyi language. I will keep you updated on this project on a regular basis over the next 18 months.

The Outside crew are working hard upgrading the grounds and moving all their gear into the shed.

The rear fence has been completed and most of the landscaping is near completion. Darryl Joinbee and Josh Ryder are currently undertaking a welding course being conducted by Charles Darwin University.

New staff and staff changes: Carol Fitz-Slade has joined us to take on the role of organising the constitutional changes to our constitution. Carol will be employed in this role until mid December 2004. Grieves has been employed in the CDEP reception area and Geraldine Plummer has moved into the position of office/typist assistant to the CDEP Women.

Darryl Joinbee has taken on the Store person's position and Josh Ryder has taken on the role of his assistant.

Many projects will be happening over the next few months leading up to Christmas. Cross Culture Workshops are planned with the Town Council Mayor, Councillor's and staff in early November 2004 and PAK Staff Cross Cultural Development programs. Staff will be attending many language meetings and workshops over the few months and many of our publications are nearing completion.


