DESERT PAINTER Art born of the bush

DOROTHY NAPANGARDI Artist

Born: Mina Mina, Northern Territory, 1948-56 Died: Near Alice Springs, aged mid-60s

Dorothy Napangardi, who died in a car crash on the Tanami Road near Alice Springs on June 1, was a titan of desert art. A reserved, softly spoken woman from Warlpiri country in the Northern Territory, Napangardi became a much-feted artist after winning the 1991 National Aboriginal Art Award for best painting in Western Media.

Over the next two decades, she would become the darling of Australia's contemporary art scene, exhibiting in many private galleries. In 2002 she was honoured by a solo exhibition at Sydney's Museum of Contemporary Art, which later toured Asia. More recently she collaborated with the Italian luxury clothes firm Ermenegildo Zegna, fashioning one of her admired sandhill paintings into a 2000sqm carpet for permanent display in the Plaza Gallery in Brisbane's Convention and Exhibition Centre.

Sought-after and collectable, her work was acquired by, among others, The National Gallery of Australia and all major Australian State galleries, the Linden Museum in Stuttgart, the Vroom Collection in the Netherlands, the Kaplan-Levi Collection in Seattle and the Kerry Stokes Collection and Holmes a Court Collection in Perth.

Despite the cosmopolitan appeal of her work, her greatest pleasures were simple: spending time with family, and hunting.

The daughter of Jeannie Lewis Napurrurla and Paddy Lewis Japanangka, she was born "out bush" near Mina Mina, remote Warlpiri country to the far north-west of Alice Springs, bordering Pintupi land.

Her mother had a daughter from a previous marriage. As with her half-sister, and siblings from her mother's second marriage, Dorothy Napangardi's birth was not "legally" registered because it took place beyond the "settled" areas.

In 2000, reminiscing about her childhood in and around Mina Mina, Napangardi recalled unconditional happiness and the sense of unqualified freedom she experienced when travelling on foot around the vast expanse of the familial estate, at night sleeping beside family members, with the stars their only canopy.

Arranged in orderly rows, their heads to the east, feet extending west, sometimes the extended family group was protected by rdupa (or yunta), minimal bough shade windbreaks (local flora permitting). During those formative years Napangardi mastered the art and science of hunting small game and gathering bush tucker, which would remain a lifelong passion. Abundant bush foods populated her homeland. Dismissed as barren and inhospitable by most of the (relatively few) non-indigenous people who have visited it, Mina Mina to Napangardi was a Land of Plenty. Napangardi estimated she was about seven or eight when her family first encountered a white person, a patrol officer, who pressed them to abandon their ancestral country. In the mid-50s — or as late as 1957 — Napangardi and her family were forcibly relocated to the

settlement of Yuendumu, hundreds of kilometres south-east of Mina Mina. There, the family's whitefella names were imposed on them.

Moreover, the local health clinic ascribed arbitrary dates of birth to all family members.

The family was deeply unhappy at Yuendumu. Not long after their arrival, Napangardi's father led the younger members of the extended family on a trek back to Mina Mina, but the authorities soon returned, taking them back again. Their way of life was no longer tenable.

Napangardi, having been promised when young to an old man, Jampijinpa, eventually left him to live in Alice Springs, after giving birth to four daughters, Julie, Sabrina, Maria and Dolores. After remarrying in the late 80s, she gave birth to her youngest daughter,

Napangardi's extraordinary spatial ability enabled her to deal effectively with huge canvases.

Older, tradition-grounded Centralian Aboriginals' exceptional orientation skills and visual-spatial ability translate into the ability to construct "mental maps". This encapsulates their ability to hold in their heads a dynamic view of huge tracts of land, cognitive maps that are continually updated as one moves through that landscape.

The ability to make these maps of expanses of country is an acquired process that in all probability can only be learnt by living in big, relatively uninterrupted vistas, rather than surrounded by four walls.

This is an enduring feature of her artwork.

In recent years, while Napangardi spent time in the Warlpiri settlements of Yuendumu and Nyirrpi and would also visit family in Adelaide, the place she considered home was Alice Springs. With her family and a strong network of Warlpiri friends, she would go hunting each weekend on the town's outskirts. Perhaps some small consolation is to be found in the fact Napangardi died surrounded by people she loved. She was hunting with extended family when, at dusk, their overloaded car rolled over. She was most likely in her early to mid-60s. 

While living in Mina Mina, Napangardi had begun receiving instruction from her grandfather on the Karnta-kurlangu/Kanakurlangu Jukurrpa (Women's or Digging Sticks Dreaming). This was as a matter of inheritance, though as a small child Napangardi was not permitted to recreate its visual imagery

These Jukurrpa would later become the principal subject matter of her most celebrated artworks.

In 1987, she met Roslyn Premont at a centre for Aboriginal artists in Alice Springs, where she had begun painting on boards. The women forged a long-term working relationship after Premont opened Gallery Gondwana in Alice Springs in 1990.

Their business collaboration ended last year when Premont closed the gallery after injury.
